decide which direction they may want to continue in - hygiene, dentistry, dental assistant, office, lab tech, etc. Meeting professionals in the industry helps students develop that career exploration.

SCDS: Do you need any special training and skills to be an in-classroom volunteer?

No special training or skills are required. The Mukilteo school district requires a background check for every volunteer. If you are interested in volunteering as a Dentist to treat patients for the clinic, they require fingerprinting along with the background check (all paid for by Sno-Isle) and a copy of your liability insurance.

SCDS: Are there other ways to be involved?

The students also enjoy class presentations. Dr. Paul Kahlon shared a presentation about the importance of child dental care and what they do in their office. Pacific Dental had the students take a field trip to their office, showed some of their equipment like the CEREC, and provided initial training with it. Willamette Dental staff presented proper resume and cover letter tips to help students. Den-
